Wonderscope is appreciated as an educational resource in our community that provides all children and families with the opportunity to build a solid foundation for success in school and beyond.


## Values

Wonder Fund is a **100 percent donor-supported fund** that enables us to share Wonderscope experiences with those who might otherwise not have the financial resources to do so.



## **New Programs**

### **Parenting with Play**

Wonderscope initiated **Parenting with Play**, an important new program to assist parents and caregivers in need of additional support in caring for their children. Through a series of four workshops, parents and caregivers learn about the importance of play and how to use play

to support their children's development, with the aim of strengthening the bonds between adult and child. During the four cohorts of

the year, Parenting with Play served 18 families, including 21 adults and 37 children. A few of our partners in this program include Jackson County Children's Division, Jackson County CASA, Crittenton Children's Center, Foster Adopt Connect, Cornerstones of Care, Kansas Children's Service League, Promise 1000, Mother's Refuge, Amethyst Place, and Jewish Family Services.

### **Adventure Field Trips**

Wonderscope launched **Adventure Field Trips**, a field trip option that features structured programming led by Wonderscope program staff in character, plus free play in the exhibits. **Spark the Dragon**, **Pip the Pirate**, **Superscope**, and **Alex the Astronaut** lead classes on Wonderscope adventures that meet educational standards in Missouri and Kansas.

# **Thriving Programs**

#### Wonder Camp

**534** campers attended Wonderscope day camps. Camp scholarships were awarded to **109** children of underserved families through the museum's Wonder Fund. Wonder Camps are offered during spring break, holiday break, summer, and days when area school districts are not in session. 2022 summer camp themes were Secret Agent Camp, Rainbow Camp, STEAM Camp, and Around the World Camp.

### **Road to Readiness**



**15** children completed Wonderscope's self-paced kindergarten readiness program and celebrated with a graduation ceremony.

### Weekday Programming

11,000 children and grownups enjoyed Circle Time, Music and Movement, Art Time, and Story Time + Craft. We also launched a new monthly Maker Space Workshop, where children can experiment with various materials and tools to plan and create a project.

# Revenue & Expenses

Wonderscope, like all non-profits, relies on a variety of funding sources to continue providing many learning opportunities for children and families.

During 2022 the focus was on increasing memberships, attendance, field trips, and birthday parties, and introducing fundraising events. Recovering from the financial effects of the pandemic was a priority.

For every non-profit, finding a strong balance between contributed and earned revenue is an ongoing focus, together with keeping tight controls on administrative and fundraising costs. 2022 brought strong financial growth for Wonderscope as we settled into a new location and new building. We grew the team at Wonderscope and welcomed many groups.

In the coming year, we are focused on retaining and growing our membership. We will continue to diversify our sources of funding by expanding our individual donor base, growing our event series, and increasing exhibit sponsors, together with continuing to seek foundation funding for our programs.

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
